## 18th Annual Charity Gala

Even though the time of year and the location are changing, the Sunflower Charity Gala promises to offer the 18<sup>th</sup> annual opportunity to support people with special needs.

The Gala is set for Saturday, Sept. 30 at the Columbus Club, 723 Main, Great Bend. Social hour begins at 5:30 p.m.; dinner will be served at 7 p.m. and the evening will wrap up at 10 p.m.

"We changed the date from late February because last year our event was the fourth local charity event during that month," said Cody Harris, director of planned giving and community support. "We recognized that people were being overwhelmed by the time they attended our Gala."

"So, we looked for a date that would not have as many conflicting events. We encourage people to mark the date on their calendars now."

The Gala is still several months away but Cody said he would accept items for the silent and live auctions anytime. "I am always looking for donations and am grateful for them whenever they come in."

Cody and his colleagues are brainstorming ideas and hope to line up some type of entertainment for the evening.

#### Pancakes/raffle

The 20<sup>th</sup> annual Sunflower Pancake Feed is set for 4 to 7 p.m. Thursday, March 30 at Prince of Peace Parish Center, 4100 Broadway, Great Bend.

Ticket price for the all-you-can-eat meal is \$8; pancakes, sausage and a drink are included. Dine-in and carry-out are available. Tickets may be purchased in advance by contacting Sunflower, 620-792-1321, or at the door.

## **Daily Living Skills Classes**

The new daily-living classes at Sunflower are enhancing the skills and expanding the interests of those who rely on our Day Services programs.

Clients are being introduced, and in some cases re-introduced, to activities that can help them attain even more independence in their day-to-day lives. Some of these sessions were available before the pandemic and are now in full swing again.

For example, cooking classes offer a variety of lessons that are not only practical, but fun too.

"One week we used only a microwave as our cooking equipment and made Rice Krispies treats," said Sarah Stromski, advocacy training and activities manager. "Another time we used the oven and made cranberry pastries. We also decorated cookies to get the feel for different techniques to use in the kitchen.

"At Christmastime," Sarah added, "gift wrapping was a topic. This is a skill that can be used year-round because our clients enjoy many gift-giving celebrations with family and friends."

Other class subjects have included how to count money, while learning the value of each coin and bill. Laundry lessons and tips also are now on the to-do list.

"We try to tackle something different every week whether in the kitchen, laundry room or elsewhere," Sarah commented. "The individuals we serve enjoy having these options that lead to more independence and self-confidence."



## Personal Accomplishments—Brady

After six months of job training and preparation, Brady Burnham earned a position at Great Western Dining at the Barton Community College kitchen. And he is loving it.

Early on, it became evident that Brady wasn't much for talking with the public. But he and his job coach, Cody Harris, quickly learned that the job doesn't have to entail much public interaction.

"Brady demonstrates to his colleagues the items he needs and they gladly accommodate him," said Cody, Sunflower's director of planned giving and community support. "Brady quickly developed a routine and away he went.

"I have been very pleased to fill this coaching role to help Brady become successful on the job. It is great to watch him grow and be productive."

The 20-year-old man shows his commitment to the job every day and takes prides in his accomplishments and earning his own paycheck.

"During winter break at the college, Brady couldn't wait to get back to work," Cody noted. "His story is just one example of what can happen when we give people choices and take advantage of the Vocational-Rehab Program."

Brady graduated from Great Bend High School last year and has been in Case Management since 2009. His hobbies include bowling, and spending time with his grandparents and other family members on the farm.

"All of us at Sunflower appreciate his family, as well as Barton Community College for supporting Brady while he searched for and found a good job," Cody commented. "His employment and leisure activities perfectly illustrate the benefits of a productive and rewarding life."

## <u>Westside Market ~ The UPS Store</u> <u>Beautiful Minds Art Studio</u>

There is a reason Nohemi Gonzalez wears so many hats in service to Sunflower and the people it serves – there is a lot happening at the Westside Market location, 5523 10<sup>th</sup> Street.

Nohemi is manager of the three Westside ventures that cater to clients and the general public.

One of those is Beautiful Minds Art Studio, where clients get their creative juices flowing. "They love making art," Nohemi said. "We have some very talented people that do such an amazing job.

"For example, Kaleb makes dragon incense burners and Pokemon characters. You just have to see these pieces, and other creations, to believe it."

The artists sell their works in the Westside Market portion of the building. Inventory includes clay pieces, paintings and candles. Twenty-five percent of sales is earmarked for studio art supplies and 75 percent goes to the artist.

"We also have about 30 Westside Market vendors from the community who work on the same commission," Nohemi said. "Merchandise includes coins, cartoon magazines and wood pieces. Another vendor has nice items made out of wire and beads. And there is so much more."

The other Westside Market venture is The UPS Store that serves the entire community and employs Sunflower clients. Its list of services is long but includes printing, binding, laminating, letterhead, business cards, envelopes, greeting cards, signs, postcards and posters.

"We also have notary services, and packing and shipping," Nohemi noted. "All you have to do is bring your items in; we will pack and ship them for you. We also accept Amazon returns.

"This location provides such wonderful opportunities for Sunflower clients, and local and area residents," she added. "We encourage everyone to stop by anytime; you may be surprised at all the services we offer."



## Personal Accomplishments—Erick

Erick began receiving Sunflower Early Education Center (EEC) services when he was just shy of turning 2 years old. At the time, Erick used five baby signs to communicate his wants and needs but didn't use them consistently unless prompted by his parents.

He also said about 10 single words but none were related to a particular food or drink during meals and snack times.

"This meant he had difficulty requesting what he would like to eat and/or drink," said Alejandra Velez, LMSW. "When Erick had these communication difficulties, he would usually pull his mom or dad to the kitchen to get him food or drink. Or he would stand in the kitchen and whine until mom or dad got him what he needed.

"Erick has now been in early-intervention services for nine months and has made tremendous strides. He uses two- and three-word phrases to request specific items, such as 'I want juice' or to tell on his sister by saying 'Drea did it."

Erick enjoys being helpful and follows directions in Spanish and English. While he is initially shy, he is able to overcome that feeling and be quite social. He is learning his numbers and letters by counting and saying the alphabet with his parents.

"He also has started trying to tell them stories about many things," Alejandra commented. "Unfortunately, these stories come out mainly as jabbering, with only one word being understood. There are still a few things to work on but Erick is making significant progress every day."

Karla Martinez, Erick's mom, said she appreciates what Sunflower has helped her son accomplish.

"Having Sunflower services in our home has been life-changing," Karla said. "No one likes to admit their child might need more support than what you as a parent can offer. Erick has made such huge strides toward his speech goals and we cannot wait to see where he ends up as we continue with services."
